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The career of Thomas F. Coleman as a civil rights advocate has spanned more than five decades. His ongoing quest for justice and equal rights for marginalized populations has involved a variety of methods – research, writing, education, and advocacy. He has sought to advance a wide range of causes – sexual civil liberties, LGBT rights, family diversity, singles' rights, freedom from violence and abuse, guardianship reform, and disability rights – through legal representation of individuals in court cases and administrative proceedings as well as class action advocacy seeking systemic change and policy reforms.

As the details in this document demonstrate, Coleman's efforts for justice and equality have been strategically directed to those who have the power to create change. Federal, state, and local government officials and agencies. Congress, legislatures, and city councils. Governors and mayors. State and federal courts. Most importantly, Coleman has worked with the media – television and radio producers and hosts, newspaper and magazine editors and journalists – to develop public support for the causes he has advanced. He has also attempted to empower self-advocates and their allies.

By convening and directing commissions, task forces, workgroups, and special projects throughout these many decades of his advocacy, Coleman has worked collaboratively with small groups of like-minded people who shared a common vision of eliminating discrimination and promoting justice for those who have needed a helping hand. Coleman's perseverance is due in large measure to the unwavering support of his life partner and husband, Michael A. Vasquez.*



Focused on protecting the rights of juveniles confined in private residential facilities. Originally known as the American Association for Single People, the <u>organization</u> focused on the legal, political, and economic, needs of 100 million unmarried workers, consumers, and taxpayers. Sought to end marital status discrimination in the workplace, marketplace, and public policies. Editor of Unmarried America <u>Newsletter</u> from 1999 - 2003. Editor of Singles' Rights Lobby <u>Newsletter</u> from 1999 to 2000.

1987 - 1999 Family Diversity Project

Promoted corporate and government use of broad and inclusive definitions of family. Worked with media to in order to gain support for changes in public policies and corporate practices to end discrimination on the basis of marital status and family structure.

1986 - 1989 University of Southern California Law School

Adjunct professor teaching the first "Right of Domestic Partners" class at any law school in the nation. Students worked on research papers for the Family Diversity Task Force (1986 - 1988). <u>Part I, Part II, Part III, Part IV, Part V</u>. Students also did <u>research papers</u> for the City Attorney's Consumer Task Force on Marital Status Discrimination (1989).

1985 - 1987 Domestic Partners Equity Fund

Under the auspices of the Institute for the Study of Human Resources (foundation of One. Inc.) and with funding from the Lloyd E. Rigler and Lawrence E. Deutch Foundation, Coleman directed the Domestic Partners Equity Fund which conducted research, education, and advocacy activities to promote equal rights of unmarried couples regardless of gender and to protect such relationships from martial status discrimination. The fund dissolved when Spectrum Institute was formed in 1987.

1972 - 2000 National Committee for Sexual Civil Liberties

Member of this organization for three decades, first known as the National Committee for Sexual Civil Liberties from 1970 to 1981, then as the American Association for Personal Privacy from 1982 to 2000. The group, consisting of about two dozen gay men from various academic disciplines and professional fields, advocated for the rights of consenting adults, decriminalization of statutes penalizing consenting adult sex, and sought civil rights laws prohibiting marital status and sexual orientation discrimination. Co-chair from 1975 to 1981. Cochair Arthur Warner delivered <u>remarks</u> at a reception in 1981 at which the group conferred the Mathew O. Tobriner Civil Liberties Award on Coleman.\

1975 - 1979 Sexual Law Reporter

Founding publisher, and editor of this national periodical that analyzed and reported on developments in sexuality and the law – administrative, legislative and judicial. Subscribers included lawyers, judges, libraries, and others.

1972 - 1973 Gay Law Students Association

Founding president of the first gay law student association in the nation, with members from several law schools in the Los Angeles area. Coordinator of <u>Arraignment Intervention Project</u>. Co-author of an article in 1973 titled "Discriminatory Enforcement of the Law as a Defense to a Criminal Prosecution." Co-author of investigative report in 1973 titled "<u>Enforcement of Section 647(a) of the California Penal Code by the Los Angeles Police</u> <u>Department</u>." The California Supreme Court cited the investigative report when it declared the lewd conduct statute unconstitutionally vague. (*Pryor v. Municipal Court* (1979) 25 Cal.3d 238 fn. 8) The defense was used more recently when a judge in Long Beach dismissed a lewd conduct charge in 2017 on the ground of discriminatory enforcement of the law against gay men by the police.

1972 - 1973 American Bar Association - Law Student Division

Delegate from Loyola Law School. Author of resolution and report to the Law Student Division in 1973 titled "Unmarried Persons Bill of Rights." The resolution was approved. It called on states to prohibit marital status discrimination Author of resolution to the Law Student Division in 1973 titled "Good Moral Character as a Requirement for Admission to the Bar. The resolution declared that sexual orientation or private consensual conduct of an applicant to or member of the bar shall not be grounds for investigation, denial of admission or disciplinary action by bar association.

Have written letters, memos, legal briefs, newspaper commentaries, law review articles, executive orders, proclamations, and public policy reports. Have written a weekly column for a website blog. Have been the publisher and editor of a legal periodical and the editor of an association's newsletter. Have also created, edited, and updated websites.

Appellate Litigation

Have represented clients in successful litigation in the United States Supreme Court and state supreme courts in Alaska, California, Georgia, Michigan, and New York. Have also represented dozens of clients in the California Court of Appeal.

Volunteer Coordinator

Coordinated the activities of dozens of volunteers in several projects. The Personal Privacy Commission involved 25 commissioners and 50 public hearing witnesses. The Family Diversity Task Force involved 37 members, 12 interns, and 40 witnesses. Some 20 members, seven interns, and 20 witnesses participated in the Consumer Task Force on Marital Status Discrimination.

Nonprofit Sector

Directed the staff and volunteers of Spectrum Institute and its projects from 1987 to the present. Have also worked closely and cooperatively with dozens of other nonprofit educational and advocacy organizations.

2021 ADA Judicial Compiance Project

This project had five phases involving outreach to the judges and <u>ADA</u> <u>coordinators</u> in the superior courts in all 58 counties in California. A webinar for judges was produced. A student intern wrote a paper on her findings regarding the level of compliance of the courts in following the manates of the Americans with Disabilities Act.

2015 - 2016 Voting Rights Restoration Project

This project advocate that voting rights be restored to thousands of adults with disabilities who were wrongfully stripped of their right to vote in conservatorship proceedings. It was prompted by the case of David Rector. <u>Press Release</u>. Letter to Los Angeles Superior Court.

2001 - 2003 Unmarried and Single Americans Week

Promoted National Singles' Week in 2001 to call attention to the growing number of single people and unmarried couples in the United States and the need to protect them from discrimination as workers, consumers, and taxpayers. Convinced the Census Bureau to release a <u>radio spot</u> in 2001 recognizing National Singles Week and annual <u>press releases</u> since 2003 as part of their Facts for Features series, commemorating Unmarried and Single Americans Week. Held

events in Washington DC in 2003, including a congressional briefing and a reception. Had governors had mayors throughout the nation issue proclamations commemorating the week in 2001 and 2002.

2000 - 2001 Stop the Stigma Campaign

Directed the activities of this campaign sponsored by the American Association for Single People. The goal was to have legislators repeal laws that referred to children born to unmarried parents as "bastards" or "illegitimate children" and to have judges top using similar terms. The project did outreach to judicial associations, attorneys general, and legislators. Laws were reformed in Delaware, Illinois, and Maine. The heads of various judges associations responded favorably and shared our information with their members.

1997 - 2002 University of California Domestic Partner Project (Video - May 2002)

Advocated that the Regents authorize equal benefits for the same and oppositesex domestic partners of university employees and retirees as are afforded to spouses. The goal was achieved for <u>surviving domestic partners</u> of active employees and retirees. A <u>comprehensive set</u> of other benefits is available.

1994 - 1999 Hawaii Domestic Partner Project

Advocated for the Hawaii Legislature to pass a comprehensive domestic partnership law to give same and opposite-sex unmarried couples living in committed relationships the same rights and benefits as married couples under state law. The Legislature was considering how to respond to a state Supreme Court decision questioning the exclusion of same-sex couples from marriage. The Legislature adopted a <u>civil union law</u> in 2011 for all unmarried couples regardless of gender. Same-sex marriage became legal in Hawaii after a ruling by the United States Supreme Court in 2015. Essay: "<u>Civil Unions for All</u>"

1991 Long Beach Family Diversity Project

Principal advisor to a special project sponsored by the Long Beach Human Relations Commission, with funding from Kaiser Permanente, to study family diversity in Long Beach and to recommend ways the city could improve family life for its diverse residents.

- 1993 1994 Insurance Commissioner's Anti-Discrimination Task Force Served as a member of this 30-member Task Force which was convened by the Insurance Commissioner of California. Chaired the Marital Status Discrimination Workgroup. Author of its Final Report

Dozens of students took the class and also served as interns for the Task Force on Family Diversity, the Task Force on the Changing Family, and the Consumer Task Force on Marital Status Discrimination.
- 1983 1989 <u>Commission on Racial, Ethnic, Religious and Minority Violence</u> Served as a member of this 16-member Commission convened by the Attorney General of California. Conducted hearings and issued a variety of reports on how hate crimes and other forms of bias-related violence could be reduced.
- 1981 1982 <u>California Commission on Personal Privacy</u> Served as Executive Director of this 25-member Commission convened by the Governor of California. Conducted public hearings and issued a report recommending ways in which the state could better protect the personal privacy rights of its resident.
- 1978 1979 <u>Housing Discrimination</u> Successfully lobbied the administration of Gov. Jerry Brown to begin receiving and investigating complaints of housing discrimination based on the sexual orientation of tenants or applicants for rental housing under and existing statute that had been interpreted by the Supreme Court as prohibiting arbitrary discrimination by business establishments.
- 1975 1991 *Employment Discrimination*

After advocacy with the Fair Employment Practices Commission to interpret "sex" in current law as including "sexual orientation" proved unsuccessful, and after years of lobbying for a legislative amendment to add sexual orientation to the fair employment act was successful, only to be vetoed by Gov. Pete Wilson, Coleman "trapped" the Wilson administration into ordering job protections for gays under an existing provision of the Labor Code, thus gaining statewide protection from such discrimination through executive branch action.

1975 - 1982 Conditions of Probation

Successfully challenged conditions of probation imposed on defendants in misdemeanor lewd conduct cases who plea bargained to lesser offenses (trespass or disturbing the peace). The conditions ordered defendants not to associate with known homosexuals or frequent places where homosexuals congregated.

1975 <u>Gay Rights Summer Project – National Lawyers Guild</u> Mentor to four gay and lesbian law students who worked on various projects to advance LGBT rights. Photo of Coleman, students and other mentor.

Counsel for amicus curiae which petitioned the California Supreme Court to order the opinion of the Court of Appeal in this case to be unpublished because "The opinion undermines the statutory requirement that less restrictive alternatives be explored and that an order of conservatorship should be entered only if such alternatives are not feasible." The petition was granted and the appellate opinion was removed from the official reports.

Conservatorship of A.E. (2019) No. B297092

Counsel for amicus curiae which sent an <u>ex parte notice</u> to the court's ADA coordinator regarding the need for appointment of counsel in the Court of Appeal as an ADA accommodation for a conservatee who was unrepresented in an appeal. In response, the court <u>appointed counsel</u>. The case resulted in a <u>published opinion</u> reversing the order of conservatorship.

Delaney v. Superior Fast Freight (1993) 14 Cal. App. 4th 590

Co-counsel for an employee who <u>appealed a ruling</u> of the superior court that the Los Angeles city ordinance prohibiting sexual orientation discrimination in employment was invalid on the ground it was preempted by California Labor Code section 1101 which had been interpreted by the California Supreme Court and the Attorney General as including protection against such discrimination as a matter of state law.

People v. Hill (1980) 185 Cal.App.3d 831

Counsel for appellant challenging a conviction under a pandering statute. The conviction was reversed after the court interpreted the statute as not applying to payments of money to someone who merely posed in the nude and who did not engage in sexual activity.

Superior Court of the State of California for the County of Los Angeles – Appellate Division

People v. Rylersdam (1982) 130 Cal.App.3d Supp. 1 (Appellate Division)

Co-counsel for appellant in a case challenging the imposition of conditions of probation on a defendant convicted of misdemeanor lewd conduct in an adult bookstore. The appellate division held that it was unreasonable to require a defendant, while on probation, not to associate with known homosexuals or frequent places where homosexuals congregate.

<u>People v. Ripley</u>, Appellate Division of the Superior Court of Los Angeles (1980) No. 16440 Counsel for appellant in a case which challenged the constitutionality of the mandatory registration as a sex offender for defendants convicted of misdemeanor lewd conduct. The appellate court held that the trial court denied defendant due process by refusing to hold an evidentiary hearing on the issue. This case was a precursor to In re Reed (1983) 33 Cal.3d 914 in which the California Supreme Court ruled that mandatory sex registration for such a minor offense was cruel and unusual punishment. The Reed case was handled in the Supreme Court by attorney Jay Kohorn. I represented Reed in the trial court and on appeal to the Appellate Department of the Los Angeles Superior Court before turning the case over to Jay when I left my law practice to become Executive Director of the Governor's Commission on Personal Privacy in 1981.

Farnia v. Superior Court, (1980) No. C 334198

Co-counsel for <u>amicus curiae</u> in a case where the goal was to convince the court to rule that it was unconstitutional to criminalize private sex between consenting adults. The goal was not achieved in this case, although the argument was accepted by the U. S. Supreme Court in another case in 2003.

<u>Videos of TV Broadcasts</u> Equal Rights Advocacy in the News

2006 CNN / Unmarried-America

Television segment on unmarried Americans rising up to complaint about discrimination in employee benefits, insurance rates, and other consumer transactions. Thomas F. Coleman is interviewed in the segment which aired on December 20, 2006.

2004 <u>CNN Financial Network – The Flip Side</u> In this segment, Thomas F. Coleman was interviewed about the need for economic fairness for single people. Program aired on March 8.

2004 <u>KCET – Life and Times – Equal Rights for Unmarried People</u> Thomas F. Coleman was interviewed by reporter Toni Guinard about equal rights for unmarried people. The program aired on March 17. KCET is a *PBS station in Los Angeles.*

2003 Fox News - Heartland - Singles Rights Thomas F. Coleman was interviewed by Heartland host John Kasich about singles' rights. Kasich challenged Coleman on many fronts, but Coleman held his ground. The segment aired in 2003.

2001 CTV - National Singles Week in Washington DC

This Canadian televisions station produced a segment about single people during National Singles Week in September 2001. The American Association for Single People commemorated the week with events in Washington DC. AASP member Perry Heath recites a poem he wrote about single people. Thomas F. Coleman appeared in the segment.

2001 Federal News Service – Channel 8 – Washington DC - Unfair Taxation FNS interviewed Thomas F. Coleman about unfair taxation of unmarried Americans. Coleman answered questions from the co-hosts as well as viewers who called in to the show.

2000 <u>CNN - Anderson Cooper 360 - Single Voters</u> In this news segment, Anderson Cooper discusses census data showing the rising number of single people who live alone. He notes that political candidates cater to families and usually ignore singles. Thomas F. Coleman is interviewed and the American Association for Single People is mentioned.

2000 <u>CNN - World View - Single Voters</u> Thomas F. Coleman is interviewed in this segment focusing on single voters.

2000 Singles' Right in the News -- 2000

In the first part of this video, KTVU in San Francisco reports on how presidential candidates in the 2000 election are ignoring single voters. In the second part, Val Zavala at KCET public television in Los Angeles focuses on discrimination against single people. Thomas F. Coleman is interviewed in both segments.

1998 New York TV News -- Job Benefits Discrimination

Several New York television stations carried news stories about the filing of a federal lawsuit against Bell Atlantic for offering job benefits to employees with same-sex partners but denying benefits to unmarried workers with opposite-sex partners. Thomas F. Coleman was a consultant on the case involving Paul Foray and his long time female partner. The case alleged the practice was sex discrimination in violation of the Equal Pay Act.

1997 Fox - O'Reilly Report - Singled Out

In this episode of the O'Reilly Report, Thomas F. Coleman is interviewed about a growing movement to protect unmarried individuals and couples from discrimination. The segment aired in August 1997.

1992 Los Angeles Channel 9 - Crosscheck / Rental Discrimination

Thomas F. Coleman is interviewed on this program about a court ruling in California allowing a landlord to refuse to rent to an unmarried couple for religious reasons. Prospective tenant Verna Terry is also interviewed. Segment aired on Jan. 18, 1992.

1991 Media Blitz - Unmarried Renter Rights Violated

A decision by the <u>California Court of Appeal</u> granting a religious exemption to a landlord which allows her to reject unmarried couples as tenants caused a stir in the media. Thomas F. Coleman intervened to represent the tenant to overturn the decision. He was supported by a coalition of civil rights groups including the ACLU. Other news segments focused on insurance discrimination. News also focused on a bill in the legislature to create a domestic partnership registry for unmarried couples. The California Supreme Court granted review of the case at the urging of Coleman and a <u>coalition of civil rights organizations</u>, but later dismissed the case without a decision. A few years later, the Supreme Court took up another case <u>in which it ruled</u> that landlords in the business of renting cannot use their religious beliefs to discriminate against unmarried couples.

1991 Today Show - CNN News - NBC - Rights for Unmarried Couples

Census data showing the rising number of unmarried couples caught the attention of national media. With growing numbers, should unmarried couples have rights? Should discrimination against them be outlawed. Thomas F. Coleman was among those interviewed for these news segments in May 1991. Coleman was flown to New York to appear on the Today show.

1990 KCAL-TV / Insurance Discrimination Against Unmarried Consumers

A television station in Los Angeles ran a news segment to highlight a report released by California Insurance Commissioner John Garamendi calling for an end to marital status discrimination by insurance companies. Thomas F. Coleman headed up the study and wrote the report.

1990 ABC - CBS - NBC / Discrimination Against Single People

The release of the final report of the Los Angeles City Attorney's Consumer Task Force on Marital Status Discrimination in 1990 got national media attention. Singles' Rights was on the local and national news. Thomas F. Coleman wrote the report. Task Force co-chair Christopher McCauley was interviewed in one of the news broadcasts.

1989 ABC-Nightline / Redefining Family

In this episode of ABC's Nightline, Thomas F. Coleman debates Gary Bauer from the Family Research Council. The debate was prompted by a decision of New York's highest court holding that unmarried couples can be considered a family under New York law. The episode aired in July 1989.

1989 Fox News Los Angeles - Governor Vetoes Gay Job Protection Bill

Airing in July 1989, this news segment covered the veto of by Gov. Pete Wilson of a job protection bill for gays and lesbians which resulted in rioting in the streets of Los Angeles and San Francisco. Thomas F. Coleman was interviewed.

For over three years, ABC10's investigation "The Price of Care" has been digging into California's conservatorship system. Tom Coleman's expertise was a main contributor and invaluable voice to our reporting. A court-appointed tool to help those who cannot care for themselves, conservatorships are legally complex – resulting in a lack of oversight and media coverage. Coleman's ability to break down and explain not only the system's intricacies, but its incompetence and brokenness, allowed our reporting to shine a light on how abuse and harm is being allowed to happen under a multi-billion-dollar state agency. His advocacy, passion and in-depth knowledge of a system so few

understand, or have even heard of, was crucial in our reporting that led to the passage of new state laws, changes in policies and a federal call for oversight.

Andie Judson is an investigative reporter with ABC-!0 television in Sacramento, California. She has been honored with a Peabody nomination, National Investigative Reporter & Editors Award and several regional Edward R. Murrow and Emmy Awards.

Rosalind Alexander-Kasparik - on Legal Advocacy



Tom Coleman saved my heart David Rector's humanity by pivotally restoring his voting rights. David suffered an aortic dissection that left him unable to move purposefully or speak. As was typical at the time, the judge took David's right to vote after the court-appointed guardian ad litem had taken David's life savings along with mine. They all then exited leaving us broken and broke. Civically inclined, David resented the taking of his voting rights perhaps more than any of the other indignities to which he was subjected after he fell ill. In 2016, Tom Coleman was pivotal in the passage of a California law that allowed people with disabilities whose voting rights had been taken away, to regain them by simply saying, "I

want to vote." Since David was unable to speak, he placed his mark on a letter to the judge and marched it to the court (eye-tracking device powered-up on his wheelchair)—all under the steady guidance and legal counsel of Tom Coleman and the Spectrum Institute. I was frightened of the court taking David from me as it had taken everything else from us. I called 52 attorneys when David fell ill, and none would represent me. Tom Coleman remains the only attorney I know of who understands the probate guardianship morass from every perspective. Most importantly, he knows how to fix it—compassionately and for the good of the differently-abled and the people they love.

Rosalind Alexander-Kasparik and David Rector were engaged to be married when David became seriously ill. They were living together in San Diego at the time. David and Roz had moved there from Washington D.C. where David had been a producer for many years with National Public Radio. After his illness, David and Roz had a terrible experience with the probate conservatorship system in California. Their quest to restore David's right to vote is depicted in a segment of the documentary film Pursuit of Justice.

Charles Brumlik, JD, PhD - on Legal Advocacy & Consulting Services



In the last 25 years of my being an attorney, I have never met a more effective expert, attorney, or advocate than Tom Coleman. Tom almost single-handedly saved my son Peter from an unwanted guardianship which would have resulted in a wholesale loss of civil rights. Without Tom's consultation on my son's case, today Peter would have no say in determining his own future.

Why I believe Tom Coleman dramatically improves the odds of preserving civil rights of high functioning young adults: not only is Tom a master strategist and tactician, but he is tenacious and generous; instead of getting bogged down in all the emotion and red herrings, Tom clearly sees and articulates the underlying issues; with a lifetime as a civil rights attorney, Tom brings a holistic

approach to completely turn around cases such as my son's.

Tom affects real change in a world where everyone has an opinion or wants to make money from families, but no one dares to chellenge the system's excesses and judicial abuses.



He fights for the victims, he fights for the truth, and he does so with the passion of someone who knows that too many players in the probate court system in this country are out for themselves and prey upon the defenseless – the elderly, the young, and those who can't afford their own attorneys to fight back. Thank you, Tom, for fighting the good fight – by insisting on more transparency and accountability in our badly broken probate courts."

Lanny Davis is currently representing Bradford Lund, grandson of the late Walt Disney, as co-counsel in a federal lawsuit alleging discrimination against Lund by a judge in the probate division of the Los Angeles Superior Court. In a related matter, Spectrum Institute supported Lund's petition for review in the California Supreme Court. During the tenure of President Bill Clinton, Davis served as Special Counsel to the President. He was an appointee of President George W. 

He later served as the judicial appointments secretary to Governor Gray Davis. He later was appointed and then elected as a judge of the Los Angeles County Superior Court. He is now retired.

Arthur C. Warner, Ph.D., LL.B. - on Advocacy



"This should be viewed as a small token of recognition for your continuing work to elevate the movement for gay civil liberties into a cause worthy of inclusion in the roster of crusades for social justice. It has mattered not whether the objects of your concern were transgendered persons, the handicapped, the elderly, homosexuals or heterosexuals, your labors in the vineyard of ethics have always served as a paragon for humanity.

"In your own life you transformed your narrow, parochial schooling into a

personal credo of inclusivity, thereby enlarging everyone's vision of morality. And you continue to pursue your goal of righteousness under the framework of the American constitutional system, now become the avatar of morality within the mansion-house of human conscience.

"Time will ultimately redress the imbalance which continues to deny you your due."

These comments are taken from a letter written in 1998 by Arthur C. Warner (1918 - 2007). Warner, a graduate of Princeton University and Harvard Law School, was the founder and co-chair of the National Committee for Sexual Civil Liberties (1970 - 1982) later known as the American Association for Personal Privacy (1982 - 2000).

Paula Ettelbrick – on Advocacy



"I have known, loved and worked with Tom Coleman for over two decades, particularly during my years as staff attorney/legal director of Lambda Legal, and director of public policy for the National Center for Lesbian Rights.

"In my view, Tom's work and analysis of relationship recognition stands as an important, and often ignored, bridge between the women's rights/feminist movement and the emerging LGBT movement. He believed, as many of us did, that all relationships/families have value, and that our job as lawyers representing the LGBT "outsiders" must be dedicated to ensuring that the rights, privileges and respect for families extend not solely to those who are married - whether same-sex or opposite sex - but to all who take on the love and commitment of another person. He contributed to our structuring and understanding of emerging concepts of domestic partnership.

"He, in his eloquent and determined way, encouraged us to look at broader social justice goals in crafting hospital visitation policies, workplace benefits, and the full range of policies impacting on families so that the LGBT community's contribution to our social and legal understanding of family structures not be limited to protecting the rights only of those who are married, whether gay or straight.

"In an era in which the fight for marriage has become all consuming, it is important to note that regardless of where the marriage movement leads us, there will always be the need to ensure that those LGBT couples who choose not to marry not be left behind."

Paula Ettelbrick's 25 years as an advocate for LGBT rights began in 1986 at Lambda Legal as a staff lawyer, before advancing to become its legal director. She held directorships in a number of major lesbian and gay organizations, including the National Center for Lesbian Rights, the Empire State Pride Agenda, the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, and the International Gay and Lesbian Human Rights Commission.

Update

New Jersey Advocacy

Traveled to New Jersey in June 2024 to help a young self-advocate lobby against a bad bill that would make it easier to put people into guardianship and harder to get out. Produced a <u>memo</u> highlighting the many flaws of the bill. Had meetings with governor's office, legislators, and the author of the bill. Offered a<u>mendments</u> to the bill. Produced a <u>report</u> with suggestions for a new statute with comprehensive provisions on supported decision-making. Wrote an <u>article</u> titled "NJ Adults with Cognitive Disabilities: Some Need Guardianships, Most Don't"

Missouri Project

Wrote the <u>final report</u> of the Missouri Medical Rights Workgroup and an announcement of its release on September 10, 2024. Produced an <u>annotated bibliography</u> of 26 reports, commentaries, brochures, and PowerPoints prepared for the workgroup.

Department of Justice

New Jersey Appellate Victory

After more than two years of collaborating and providing consulting services to a young autistic student and his attorneys in the unwanted guardianship case, and after filing an <u>amicus curiae</u> <u>brief</u> for several organizations in his appeal, Peter won his case. The appeals court <u>ruled</u> that his rights were violated and ordered the guardianship proceeding dismissed.

Archives

This section of the curriculum vitae contains links to materials pertaining to the research, writing, and advocacy of Thomas F. Coleman as a law student (1972 - 1973) and as a young lawyer (1974 - 1982). Although Coleman's personal archives were burned in a fire at a storage facility in the late 1980s, he had sent copies of many documents to Arthur Warner, a colleague with the National Committee for Sexual Civil Liberties. Warner kept the documents and prior to his death in 2006, donated all his papers to Princeton University. Paper copies of tens of thousands of pages of documents are housed in the Mudd Manuscript Library at the university. In 2024, Coleman visited the collection and identified documents that were most worthy of being digitized so that they would be available to students, scholars, historians, and advocates around the world. Warner was an advocate for homosexual rights, decriminalization of consenting adult sex, and sexual civil liberties during the 1950s through the end of the 20th century. As a result of Coleman's intervention and advocacy with the university, most of Warner's papers are now <u>available online</u>. What is listed here are documents in the collection that pertain to Coleman.

1972 ABA – Law Student Division – Resolution – Unmarried Person's Bill of Rights

Coleman was the representative from Loyola Law School in Los Angeles to the American Bar Association Law Student Division in 1972 and 1973. More than 100 accredited law schools had a representative in the Law Student Division. During his tenure as a representative from Loyola, Coleman introduced three resolutions for adoption by the Law Student Division. One was titled "Unmarried Person's Bill of Rights." It called on the ABA to support the passage of legislation to protect unmarried adults from discrimination due to their marital status in employment, housing, credit, and insurance and to support the repeal of provisions of the income tax code that imposed higher taxes on unmarried people than married people. A report documenting the extent of such discrimination accompanied the resolution. It was adopted by the Law Student Division and transmitted to the House of Delegates of the ABA for consideration. Leadership in the Law Student Division <u>made this resolution a priority</u>.

1972 National Committee for Sexual Civil Liberties – Membership

In December 1972, Coleman <u>accepted an invitation</u> to become a member of the National Committee for Sexual Civil Liberties. At that time, <u>members and consultants</u> consisted of prominent lawyers and scholars from various academic fields. Coleman was the second law student to become a member, the first being <u>Craig Patton</u> who was <u>admitted to the bar</u> in Ohio after a year of <u>investigations</u> and a hearing to decide whether his admitted homosexual status rendered him unfit. The <u>purpose of the committee</u> was to promote the decriminalization of consenting adult sex and to secure equal rights for homosexuals. It was formed in 1971 as an outgrowth of the legal committee of the Mattachine Society of New York – perhaps the first gay rights organization in the nation. Arthur Warner was chair of the legal committee of the Mattachine Society. He founded the National Committee and served as its co-chair until it changed its name in 1982 to the American Association for Personal Privacy. Coleman served as co-chair of the National Committee from 1975 to 1981.

1973 ABA – Law Student Division – <u>Resolution</u> – Admission to the Bar

Coleman <u>drafted</u> and introduced a resolution to the American Bar Association Law Student Division that asked the association to adopt a policy statement that the sexual orientation or private sexual conduct of a student or lawyer would not be grounds for investigation, denial of admission to the bar or discipline so long as the sexual conduct was with someone above the legal age of consent. Coleman also submitted the resolution to the ABA <u>Section on Individual Rights</u>. After it was <u>adopted</u> by that section, it was submitted to the Section on Legal Education. At Coleman's <u>suggestion</u>, the resolution was later <u>submitted by Professor Walter Barnett</u>, co-chair of the National Committee at the time, to the governing body of the American Association of Law Schools. Barnett, Coleman, Craig Patton, and Carry Boggan <u>worked together</u> to move the resolution through the ABA and supported Barnett's efforts to gain support from the American Association of Law Schools.

1973 Gay Law Students Association – Legal Memo – Discriminatory Enforcement Defense

Coleman and Rick Angel, both openly gay students at Loyola Law School in Los Angeles, prepared a legal memo on discriminatory enforcement of the law as a legal defense to a criminal prosecution. The memo was intended for use in connection with the "Black Pipe 21" case pending in the Los Angeles Municipal Court. The case involved 21 men who were being prosecuted for lewd conduct after they were arrested during a police raid on a gay bar at an event sponsored by a gay organization known as H.E.L.P. (Homophile Enforcement of Legal Protection) which was raising funds to assist gay men who were or would be entrapped and arrested by the police for conversations about sex or for consenting adult sex. If a facial constitutional challenge to the lewd conduct law itself were unsuccessful, then the defense attorneys would seek a dismissal based on discriminatory enforcement of the law. The legal memo was bolstered by a <u>statistical study</u> of discriminatory enforcement practices by the Los Angeles Police Department by Coleman and University of Southern California gay law student Barry Copilow. The Gay Law Student Association issued a <u>press release</u> when the legal memo and <u>statistical analysis</u> were published. The statistical analysis was updated in 1974 by a <u>study of police practices</u> in West Los Angeles conducted by student Chet Toy under Coleman's supervision.

1973 Prostitution and the Police – <u>Research Paper</u> – Law Enforcement Practices

Coleman, Loyola Law School student Susan Wendt, and UCLA Law School graduate Rand Schrader, wrote a report documenting the practices of the Los Angeles Police Department enforcing a statute (Penal Code Section 647(b)) prohibiting soliciting or engaging in acts of prostitution.

1974 - 1980 Sexual Law Reporter – <u>Legal Publication</u>

Prior to the advent of the Internet, legal research was very time consuming and cumbersome. While there were special publications to assist lawyers and judges find and understand legislation, statutes, and judicial precedents in the general areas of criminal, civil, and constitutional law, information relevant to gay rights and other aspects of human sexuality was difficult to find. To fill the research gap, Coleman proposed establishing a Sexual Law Reporter. When he was unable to gain funding for the project, Coleman himself created a California <u>corporation</u> known as the Sexual Law Reporter. It became an all-volunteer effort that operated out of his home with the assistance of law students and others. It began publishing in 1975 and ceased operations at the end of 1979. Subscribers included lawyers, law libraries, judges, scholars, and advocates for gay rights and sexual civil liberties. The publication received <u>positive reviews</u> from librarians, legislators, and organizations such as the ACLU, National Organization for Women, and the *Student Lawyer* (a publication of the American Bar Association Law Student Division). It also received <u>publicity</u> in the gay press. One volunteer wrote a <u>short story</u> about the formation and early days of the publication.

1975 - 1980 Executive Branch Advocacy

When the California Legislature passed a bill to decriminalize private sex between consenting adults, Coleman turned his attention to the executive branch as a source for securing civil rights protections for gays. Most advocates for gay rights had been focusing their attention on the legislative and judicial branches of government, mostly ignoring the executive branch as a source for securing gay rights. Stimulated by progress made with the executive branch in Pennsylvania, Coleman wrote a manifesto titled "After Sodomy Reform - What Next" which was publicized by the gay press. Among his first actions with the executive branch was lobbying California Gov. Jerry Brown to appoint persons to the Fair Employment Practices Commission who would be inclined to interpret the word "sex" in the current statute to broadly include "sexual orientation" as a protected classification. He contacted Pennsylvania Gov. Milton Shapp urging him to write to Gov. Brown suggesting that he take executive action to protect gays and lesbians from discrimination. Shapp did send a letter to Brown. Coleman later wrote an essay titled "The Executive Branch: An Untapped Source of Power for Gay Rights." In 1979, Coleman was successful in convincing the an agency in the executive branch in California to rule that sexual orientation discrimination in housing is illegal. Convinced that the timing was right, Coleman wrote to Gov. Brown in 1979, urging him to immediately issue an executive order prohibiting sexual orientation discrimination in state employment. Brown issued the order on April 4, 1979. Coleman issued a press release a few days later. A paper on the efforts that led to this executive order was written by a university student later that year.

1979 - 1980 Constitutional Challenge to California's Prostitution Statute

In 1979, Coleman initiated a challenge to a statute in California prohibiting soliciting or engaging in an act of prostitution. Coleman filed a <u>demurrer</u> on privacy and free speech grounds in the Municipal Court case of *People v. Farnia*. He and attorney Jay Kohorn then filed a 138-page legal brief to explain and argue the grounds for the constitutional challenge to the statute. Several other lawyers joined on a <u>supplemental brief</u> filed by Coleman and Kohorn. Coleman also wrote a letter to the Los Angeles City Attorney explaining the rationale for and scope of the constitutional challenge. When the challenge was rejected by the Municipal Court, the attorneys filed a <u>petition</u> and <u>exhibits</u> with the Superior Court seeking an order to restrain the lower court from proceeding with the prosecution, arguing that the statute was unconstitutional and therefore the Municipal Court lacked jurisdiction to proceed. The constitutional challenge was rejected by the Superior Court.

1981 Litigation Docket

By 1981, Coleman and his colleagues with the National Committee for Sexual Civil Liberties, were involved numerous cases around the country challenging laws criminalizing consenting adult sex. This included cases pending in the United States Supreme Court, the Oklahoma Court of Criminal Appeals, and the Oregon Court of Appeals, as well as a variety of cases pending before appellate courts in California.

1981 Mathew O. Tobriner Civil Liberties Award

With the <u>approval</u> of Justice Tobriner, Coleman received an <u>award</u> for his advocacy activities at annual meeting of the National Commitee for Sexual Civil Liberties in Detroit in 1981. A <u>testimonial</u> to Coleman was delivered by Arthur C. Warner, co-chair of the National Committee.
